THE CENTRE FOR PROTECTION OF CHILDREN

In 2010 the association between Vietnam Swans and Trung Tam Bao Tre Em (Centre for Protection of Children) Vung Tau/Long Hai was established. In this time the Swannies have visited the children and made significant gifts to the centres. We take so much pleasure from introducing people to the children and dedicated staff at these centres.

In 2019, a group of young children were taken in to the Vung Tau Centre and as a consequence it was decided to re-open the kindergarten which we helped to establish in 2008. All these children are now enjoying an introduction to their education and a nicely equipped and staffed school room.

Children at the Vung Tau Centre are homeless through many unfortunate circumstances. Some are orphaned and grandparents are no longer able to care for them; parents are sick or in jail; babies abandoned at hospitals; some have been found living on streets and others just left at parks and beaches when desperate family cannot cope. In most cases they are aware that these children will be well cared for by the centres. The number of severely disabled children is growing and their health and personal care needs are enormous.

The Long Hai school was established to provide education for children of extremely poor families. These children were working for the family all day. They now go the school for half a day and are free to work for the rest of the day. Each child is given a good, hot meal before leaving. The boys doing motorbike repairs, work all day and it is so rewarding to know many have moved on to get jobs outside the school. The dressmaking class are also very productive and some have moved to employment. Each year they make uniforms for all the students and there is always a need for help to provide the materials for these uniforms. Cannot over stress the dedication of the staff most of whom have been with the school from Day 1.

This year, like previous years we are looking forward to starting the ANZAC Friendship Weekend with , a visit to the school with players and friends from the Vietnam Swans ahead of the annual ANZAC Friendship Match against Singapore Wombats. The Swans have long been proud supporters of the Centre and School. The school has indicated a number of crucial items which need to be replaced and we are hoping to be able to help them out.

If you would like to contribute to the centre's in any way please do reach out to Ron & Ailsa. There is always ongoing needs big and small that can make huge differences to the experiences of the needy kids in both centres.

Legends vs All Stars



The Legends vs All Stars game is a long running tradition of the ANZAC Friendship Match. It was born out of the number of Swans players, family and friends who have been so caught up in the event's pull that they continually want to be a part of the event. Returning, current and first time players in Vietnam are all welcome, with the game being based in Saigon this year weäre hoping to see a few (in)famous faces pulling on the boots and turning the legs over!

RAAF vs 2AOD

One thing is for sure, the game is 100% for fun before and after but during those 4 quarters there'll be plenty of desire to win and silky skills on display. This year the magic of the Legends vs All Stars game continues but on the occasion of our 13th Friendship match we've paid tribute to two of the original footy teams ever to play the great game in Vietnam in the RAAF and the 2OAD (2nd ordnance and disposal) playing between '66 & '71 in the spiritual home of football in Vietnam in Vung Tau. The 2AOD team will take on the mantle of the All Stars and captained by club legend and former pres Eric Kerrison while the RAAF will represent the Legends and be captained by another club legend in Adam "Stacka" Carrol.





Though the teams are a mix of old and young, new and veteran that doesn't mean the games aren't without feeling. Over the years the Legends have become renowned for fiery late match sideline rants and some stunning comebacks. They promise more of the same after several St Kilda like internal reviews into recent losses in the face of opposition salary cap breaches and scandals. The All Stars attempts to avoid recent games with excuses like some mysterious flu originating in China are over - there will be no more hiding. The Legends are promising a return to the winning ways of 2017 with spiritual leaders Rowan and Cameron Luke flying in especially. Several Legends regulars from the catchment areas in Western Melbourne and Adelaide's grittiest suburbs are also flying in especially ready to grind out another last quarter boilover!

The AFG All Stars have seen no end of inspirational players over the years but perhaps the 2018 victory piloted by coach Rocket Gillet and Captain Eric Kerrison is their proudest moment. Expect them to scour the Swans playing ranks and recruit any available talent and athleticism.

The game will likely see plenty of silky skills from veteran Swans with a bit of added run and gun from some of the current more sprightly members of the club. No matter what it will be a sight to behold and one with plenty of banter pre, during and after the game, well into the evening!



History of the VFL



OFFICIAL HISTORY OF THE VFL

(VIETNAM FOOTBALL LEAGUE) 1966 TO 1971 BY STANMIDDLETON



The Aussie Rules footy competition (Vietnam Football League) was formed within 12 months of the Australian Base (1st Australian Logistic Support Group) being established in the sand hills on the Back Beach of Vung Tau in early 1966 (it wasn't the beautiful place it is now!) The base was closed down six years later in March 1972 when the last of the Australian soldiers returned home. Football was last played in 1971.

Footy first commenced in Vung Tau when one digger (Private John Heaney, a "Nasho" from 1 Transport Platoon RAASC) was in trouble with his Commanding Officer. The CO gave him an option (actually, two options): organize a game of Aussie Rules Footy or face detention or other penalties! John (who now lives in Geelong) thought about it for a second and chose the first option! Thus the first game of Aussie Rules footy was played in Vung Tau during the latter part of 1966.

1967

A full scale competition was then organized between the various Australian units based in Vung Tau. It commenced in 1967 and ended in 1971. There were two premiership seasons played most years. The competition was known as the VFL (Vietnam Football League)!

In the early days of the VFL, most games were played at what is now known as "San Van Dong Lam Son" Stadium (now with a Greyhound Racing Track). Unbelievably, this is same venue that the annual ANZAC Friendship Match is now played.





In the early days, the ground was fondly known as The Lord Mayor's Oval by the Australian diggers! As it was a soccer ground, games were played with 14 a side when playing there. No forward or back flanks! Other games were played at the Military Academy (also a soccer field) and later on at a much larger ground near the Vung Tau Airbase.

In 1967, the first of the two premierships was won by the RAAF. Ron Vernon who with his wife Ailsa spends considerable time each year in Vung Tau helping with Orphanages run by My Huong at Vung Tau and Long Hai was a member of that team. A very strong 2 Composite Ordnance Depot team was decimated before the finals when most of their star players went on strike and did not play in the finals! I have no idea what the dispute was about! The second season in 1967 was won by 5 Company RAASC (Service Corp). Terry Holden (who I knew his family in Stawell, Victoria) and a close friend of Swannies' President Phil was a member of that premiership team.

1968

In 1968, both Premierships were won by a brilliant Ordnance team 2AOD (2nd Advanced Ordnance Depot). On each occasion they defeated 17 Construction Squadron. Led by their outstanding captain Bob McKenna, the late Tommy Perks, Micky Miller, Dick Johnston, Kevin Judge (cousin of Ken, former Hawthorn player and coach of Hawthorn and West Coast), Steve Costelow, George Soumilas, John Meehan (brother of Simon, ex St Kilda) and

many other excellent footballers. The coach was Merv Rudd. The footballers from those teams have been the focal point of reunions held every two years since 1998. Laurie Chick (brother of former Carlton Vice Captain, John Chick) also played in some of these games.

1969

The first of the 1969 premierships was won by 17 Construction Squadron (Engineers). 2AOD's run came to an end in the preliminary final or, more so the night before that final, when all their star players in the team ignored Captain, John Meehan's instructions to keep off the grog before the big game! A number of 2AODs diggers had their send off party (before returning to Australia) on that night. Everyone got "blind" except John! John Meehan is now the Senior Pension Officer at Noble Park RSL. Those who know John would have been very impressed with his self discipline on that occasion (or more so shocked)!

In the second season of 1969, 2AOD returned to the winner's list but not without a brutal struggle against 17 Construction Squadron. 2AOD's Captain was Wayne Closter (former Geelong star). In the other team was a brilliant but tough Aboriginal footballer, Glenn James. Glenn later became a very popular VFL Umpire and officiated in two VFL Grand Finals. As there was no trial by video in those days, Glenn was given the job of taking out Wayne Closter at the opening bounce! He did this to perfection and Wayne was useless for the first 3 quarters! At 34 time the scores were level! Wayne finally came good and kicked 5 goals in the last quarter and 2AOD got home. Wayne and Glenn laugh about it now whenever they see each other but Wayne was not impressed at the time!

1970

In 1970, the 2nd Premiership was won by 2AOD. They beat 5 Company RAASC in the Grand Final. We are not sure who won the other or if there was one! This team was captained by John Huggins (whose son is now married to the daughter of Steve Costelow a premiership player in the 2nd 1968 2AOD premiership team). This team included Bill Thompson who played with Essendon (VFL), Williamstown & Dandenong (VFA) and was a Liston Trophy winner in the VFA. Some other stars were



Peter Maloney, Frank Reynders and many others. Greg Perry who played with Essendon played with the 110 Signals team that year. Interestingly Greg and I played cricket together at Stawell (Victoria) in the summer of 1965-66 before I was called up for National Service in July 1966. Greg was a tear away opening bowler and I was the wicketkeeper and opening batsman!

1971

We believe there was only one premiership played for in 1971 in which 2AOD, captain/coached by Bill Thompson, beat 110 Signals in the Grand Final. 110 Sigs was captain/coached by Greg Perry. Greg however won the competition Best and Fairest with Bill runner up! That we understand was the last VFL Grand Final played in Vietnam! Bill and Greg are both great mates now and always attend Essendon Past Players functions together.

Units that competed in the competition over those years were:

- 2 Composite Ordnance Depot (1967 - changed name to 2AOD in 1968)
- 2AOD (2nd Advanced Ordnance Depot)
- 17 Construction Squadron (Engineers)
- 1 Field Hospital/8 Field Ambulance (Australian Army Hospital)

- RAAF
- 5 Company RAASC
- 102 Field Workshops (Engineers)
- 110 Signals

There may have been other units for some seasons as well.

The standard of football in the Vietnam Football League was very high. This was mostly due to the high quality of the "Nashos" drafted into the army! The competition was fierce! Rivalry between units was intense!

As for the author, I was a "Nasho" who served in Vietnam. I played in the 2 Composite Ordnance team in 2nd half of 1967 and in the 2AOD team in the first half of 1968. I returned to Australia on the eve of the first final and thus missed playing in the first premiership of 1968!

I have a strong connection with Vietnam as my wife (I met Sinh in 2002 and married her 2005) is Vietnamese. She worked in the Orderly Room at the Peter Badcoe Club for the Australian Army on the Back Beach of Vung Tau from 1968 to 1972.


Nicole Sandman

Marquee Signing from the mainland looking to fill out the roster in the middle. Actually has a nickname that she uses.



14 YEARS OF FRIENDSHIP

The ANZAC Friendship match has grown into something that any Swans player or family member looks forward to and will always look back fondly on. So many elements have combined to make this one of the most unique games of AFL on the planet. Playing on the same turf the diggers played on during down time from the horrors of war. Being in the midst of Vets who have done such wonderful things in the community around here since returning to discover a Vietnam at peace. Welcoming teams from all over Asia. The tradition of the McMillan Dinner and Middleton Address which have drawn names like Embley, Seymour and Jesaulenko (you beauty!!!). It all comes together as the weekend that means more the the Swans than any other.

Since 2010 we've played Asia's best and funnily enough only ever lost to teams from Indonesia (Jakarta twice). This weekend enables us to remember the sacrifices that were made on both sides in the war that ravaged the lands the Swans now call home whilst celebrating the great friendships that our people now enjoy and continue to develop. Footy can play a great part in these friendships and it's been a personal honour of mine to be part of all the Swan's Anzac Games to date. They will forever be some of the greatest memories of my life. Here's my sometimes cloudy memory across all those years:

2009 - Vietnam Swans v Thailand Tigers in Kanchanaburi



Wow! This was my first ever tour and what a baptism of literal fire. Mid forty degrees and a red hot opponent opened my eyes but by the end being well over 100 points down and I think having not scored a major all day most of us were cowering with our eyes closed in the fetal position. The tour remains one of the best I've ever been on though with the amazing stories of some of the heroic diggers who endured so much on the Burma Death Railway, the morning ceremony (ANZAC was a Saturday that year) and a post game cruise down the River Kwai. Great touring squad that absolutely tore Kanchanaburi a new one capped off a great weekend and in hindsight I'm not surprised left me wholeheartedly addicted to playing footy throughout Asia.

2010 - Hanoi Hawks(63) v Saigon Swans(62) Heritage Match in Vung Tau



Phil Johns, the visionary behind almost every piece of the Swans platform as a club was inspired by the power of ANZAC Day in Kanchanaburi the year before. As expats loving life in Vietnam what was amazing was how little we knew beyond Forest Gump of the war that shook the world here for over a decade. None the less. somewhat luckily we moved to play a friendship game in Vung Tau. Unbeknown to us this was the hallowed turf the diggers played on during their down time some 40 years earlier. Not only that but some of them were in the crowd - which shocked us in its size - and very quickly we were able to learn some of the history of the Australian involvement but also some of the Vietnamese side of a war that really had no winner. The two black arm-bands respect concept was born out of respect for soldier enduring the horror of war on either side of the battle. As always the North cheated thoroughly and claimed the game by a point. One great hit by Greg Stanton on the wing was a highlight. A friendship match in name but it was obvious playing here on this epic ground games were never going to be soft! As we took stock of all we learnt the gravity of what the ANZAC Friendship Match at the Lord Mayor's Oval in Vung Tau was going to become mega. We were still to see how mega.



2011 - Vietnam Swans (89) d Hong Kong Dragons (47) in Vung Tau



Part of the reason I think the Friendship Match has become such a great event was attracting one of the premier AFL Asia teams to the first ever International Match. The Dragons go deep if not win every single Asian Championships and have one of the best touring cultures in Asia. This was my first glimpse into it and it helped us to grow as a footy club immensely. The Dragons were not short of talent on this tour either but as our first international game with the crowd pouring in after hearing about the game after the previous year we played out of our skins. BOG was Angry Dave Hadley and the greatly missed Nick Shiells was up in the best. Richard Osbourne (still in very handy nick) played for both teams but definitely gave a bit more for the Swans). Despite a comfortable win on the scoreboard the game stayed in the balance all day! Coach Josh 'Pudding' Little's now famous words to "go out and (awkward pause) pull off the greatest win this Vietnam Swans has ever done(sic)" definitely rang true! Google 9 News 2011 Vung Tau Frienship Match!

2012 - Vietnam Swans (79) d China Reds (56)



The Reds were a mystery coming into this game, we hadn't seen much of them but knew that with Shanghai and Beijing combining some serious talent would be headed our way. The game was memorable for me as it was the first time my parents watched me play a game of football in Vietnam. After embarrassing myself up forward I was shifted into defense for the second quarter onto a bloke who seemed very handy. After a tough tussle that quarter dad was quick to point out that that 'handy' player was 155 game North Melbourne veteran Shannon Watt, that I should be very careful on him and good luck - just what I needed to know. Despite entering the second half shaking like a leaf the boys were too good all over the field especially in the middle with a freshly arrived Dave Oshea and skipper Dukesy all over the Chinese.

2013 - Vietnam Swans (59) defeated by Jakarta Bintangs (69)



The bubble burst! The Bintangs bought a tight, experienced touring squad and shocked us for our first loss at the Dog Track. We had plenty of great players in Vietnam at that time but the Bintangs were simply more focused and cohesive and it showed us that the way players come in and out of Asian Footy clubs the most important is to have an ongoing simple structure that blokes of all level can walk into, comprehend and function within. Very much what Rod and Jakey have been focused on in 2018.

2014 - Vietnam Swans (100) d Malaysian Warriors (11)



From the outset this was a belting led by Tra-vy 'the Butcher' Fallon. The first 2 clearances came forward with Trav taking the ball from contested scuffles and snapping amazing goals. It was going to be one of those days! Trav didn't let up going on to kick about 6 and neither did any Swannie, pounding the Warriors into the Lord Mayors Oval dust. After the heartbreak in 2013 no-one could have seen this coming but it was a welcome drubbing of one of the least liked teams in Asia. The Middleton Address that night was given by none other than AFL legend Alex Jesaulenko. Jezza praising how much Asian footy was like he remembered from his days unlike the modern polished, heartless game played on the biggest stage in Australia each winter.

Again we came out firing, Hanoi bringing their kicking boots down with Tommy Doer, Joe Vile, Grant Keys and Northern co-captain David Skowronski all kicking multiple majors.

2016 Vietnam Swans defeated by Jakarta Bintangs



Not again! The Bintangs were invited back given they'd been the only team amongst Asia's biggest opponents to knock us off. Surely they wouldn't upset us on our biggest day of the season for a second time?! 2017 Vietnam Swans (66) d Cambodian Eagles (42)



The Eagles had an amazing end to 2016 taking out an Indochina Cup we believe we should have won after upsetting us in the pool game and knocking us out of the finals. They were heading to Vung Tau planning on inflicting another embarrassing upset and are always a danger and even had our 4 x best and fairest player Dukesy on the tour! Jimmy Bairstow was given Best On Ground for his tireless work through the middle and around the ground.

2018 Vietnam Swans (66 & 48) d Thailand Tigers (47 & 21) (twice)



In 2018 we returned to our ANZAC roots, taking on the Thailand Tigers who gave us the concept 10 years earlier. With ANZAC Day falling midweek it was decided to play a 2 leg series, first in Kanchanaburi and the second in Vung Tau. Anyone who knows Asian footy knows how hard it is to go and win on the road, add the insane temperatures of Kanchanaburi to this equation and the touring Swans for game 1 were up against it. No-one told our midfield or who created drive from the centre and Darcy Wilkosz was able to control the air up forward. After half time our defense shut down the Tigers ability to score and Thai born but Viet based Reed Cuthbert was everywhere. Dinh Anh took control of his wing and the Swans were able to pull away to an invaluable win.

The first match took its toll and the Tigers returned to Vung Tau decimated by injury, lacking numbers several high profile Swans and reinforcements rung in from the Khmer Cobras were added to the Tigers squad causing a hard fought battle that was only clinched late in the 4th quarter. Eventually the Swans were able to gain ascendency across the field started by our Hanoian on field leader Jake Norris who was in everything while Oscar Silk provided a marking target all day eventually scoring 3 goals which could have been far higher. To win home and away around the ANZAC weekend was a new and amazing experience on top of what has become a great tradition of our club.

2019 Vietnam Swans tied with Indonesian Volcanoes



As the 2018 Asian Champs Indonesia came together (the Swans have previously played Jakarta on ANZAC Day) to take on the Swans on our home deck. For us, this was a massive thrill and give we'd set ourselves to win Division 2 in the Asian Champs in 2019 before stepping up to Division 1 this exposure to top flight Asian footy was exactly what the Swans were after. The game didn't disappoint, we got off to a good start before Indonesia settled, playing a skillful and tough brand of football. We stayed in the game but our bench turned into an ER ward as several injuries to key players were suffered. Regardless heading into the last quarter the game was anyone's to win. We took the lead and had chances to close it out before a last gasp forward foray by the Volcanoes ended with an after the siren shot for goal. The accurate set shot tied the scores! Our first ever tie in the 10th year vs the standing Asian Champs, wow!!! Tal (aka Libba), Oscar Silk and Tom Niit were huge offensive weapons all day enabling us to stay in a cracking game. The back line were huge in limiting the quality Indonesian attack especially Nath Milner rebounding all day.

Unfortunately in 2020 we didn't get the chance to build on the legend of the ANZAC Friendship Match due to the Covid Pandemic but this will only increase the energy focused on 2021!

2021 saw us return to Vung Tau with a domestic focus



8 teams, 4 in Hanoi, 4 in Saigon were launched and played round robin games followed by 2 epic games between the Halida Reds and the Republic Blacks. The standard was incredible and went to show that strong domestic leagues will be a key driver of our international efforts into the future.

2022 again saw domestic footy take stage



with both Men's and Women's full scale games staged alongside Gaelic and Hurling. These games proved the perfect stepping stone for our successful return to international games in the second half of the season.

Here we are back for 2023 with one of our favourite Asian Footy rivals re-igniting the magic of ANZAC Day footy in Vietnam. The 2023 ANZAC Friendship Match FAQs



1. What is "ANZAC Day"?

ANZAC Day is a national day of remembrance in Australia and New Zealand that broadly commemorates all Australians and New Zealanders "who served and died in all wars, conflicts, and peacekeeping operations" and "the contribution and suffering of all those who have served".

2. Why is ANZAC Day commemorated on 25 April each year?

25 April is the anniversary of when members of the Australian and New Zealand Army Corps (ANZAC) landed on the beaches of Gallipoli (Ottoman Empire (Turkey)) in 1915. The ANZACs were met with fierce resistance from the Ottoman Army and suffered heavy casualties.

3. What is the history of the ANZAC Friendship Match?

In 2009, the Vietnam Swans were invited to play in the Thailand Tigers' 2009 Commemorative ANZAC Match in Kanchanaburi which is near World War II's infamous Thai Burma Railway.

The following year, 2010, the Vietnam Swans played the inaugural ANZAC Friendship Match. Players were divided into two teams that were named after previous playing clubs, the Hanoi Hawks and Saigon Saints. The ANZAC Friendship Match was designed to:

Thank our hosts, the Vietnamese Government and Vietnamese people for warmly and generously welcoming us into their country

Encourage emotionally wounded people from abroad to return and experience the New World of Vietnam

Learn from those who have been here 40 years before us

Show those from abroad, through our eyes, what an amazing country Vietnam is to live and work in today

Focus attention on the number of children drowning in this country (more children die from drowning than road accidents)

Raise money for local causes supporting the future, the kids, via Swim Vietnam and the Vung Tau Orphanage.

4. Why do players wear two Black Armbands?

This is the ANZAC Friendship Match. It is about bringing people together. It's about recognizing that in times of war, people on all sides suffer.



We who live here in Vietnam are very grateful for this privilege.

Typically, only one armband is worn to commemorate the loss of life. By having all players, from all teams, in all matches wearing two black armbands, it becomes very clear that we are explicitly recognizing the losses suffered by all.

In every photo taken on the day, every player will be wearing two black armbands. This is the ANZAC Friendship Match.

5. What is the Vietnam Football League (VFL)?

In 1966, Private John Heaney was given the call: organize a game of Aussie Rules Football – or face detention for a minor disciplinary issue. He chose the latter!

The following year, 1967, a full scale competition was organized between the various Australian units based in Vung Tau.

The competition, known as the VFL (Vietnam Football League) ran until 1971. There were two premiership seasons played most years.

6. What is the Lord Mayor's Oval?

Most of the Vietnam Football League's games were played at Lam Son Stadium which is now the Vung Tau Greyhound Racing Track – and home of the ANZAC Friendship Match.

This is the same oval that the diggers used to play on but they fondly referred to Lam Son as the Lord Mayor's Oval.

7. Who is Stan Middleton?

In 2010, the Vietnam Swans were very aware that footy had been played by Australian diggers during the War – but we had been unsuccessful in tracking down any of the players or any detail of its history.

So we went ahead and played our Inaugural ANZAC Friendship Match on 24 April 2010. Then, just two weeks later, on 10 May 2014, a guy named Stan Middleton left a comment on the Swans' website:

"I served in Vung Tau in 1967-68. A full scale Aussies Rules Competition between Australian units was conducted (twice a year). The Competition commenced in either 1966 or 1967 and I believe went through to 1971."

It turned out that Stan had albums of photos,

historical documents, contacts – and we were away. The Vietnam Swans had played our Inaugural ANZAC Friendship Match just two weeks earlier – but, suddenly, we had more than 40 years' of incredibly rich history!

8. What is the McMillan Dinner?

In 2010 and 2011, we enjoyed cracking post match functions. But they were the same type of events as every other post match event we have during a standard year.

But this was a post ANZAC Friendship Match function. It needed to be different. And it needed a name.

The Vietnam Swans in 2012 named the function the McMillan Dinner. It was named in honour of Kevin "Kev" McMillan.

Kev did two tours of Vietnam: one from 1969-1970 with the 6th Battalion Royal Australian Army Regiment and the second from 1970-1971 with the Australian Army Training Team Vietnam.

Some years later, Kev returned to Vietnam in Vung Tau where he married Le. They now have two children. Together with long time friend, Peter Taylor, they played a key role in forming the Vietnam Veterans and Friends Charity. They renovated the Da Bak School and raised \$40,000 to put in new toilets and classrooms for the new school at the end of the Luscombe airfield strip at Nui Dat.

Glenn Nolan at the time said that Kev is "a man that gave Australia two years of his life and has come back and helped to rebuild a country he fought in. But it's in a true ANZAC tradition. They may have been foe but are now friends and this, Kev, has proven."

Kev was a passionate rugby man who loved to mock the southerners' "aerial ping pong". But while he didn't care about the footy per se, this rugby man was passionate about what the ANZAC Friendship Match represented.

It's always hardest to start something and Kev was there at the very beginning of the ANZAC Friendship Match in 2010.

Unfortunately, Kev was not able to be at the Inaugural McMillan Dinner on 21 April 2012. He was in Australia being treated for cancer. Stephen



Drummond filmed the night for him, however. The footage was uploaded onto YouTube and Kev was able to watch it from his hospital bed which he loved greatly.

Ten days later, Kev passed away, "chuffed" that the McMillan Dinner had been named in his honour.

9. What is the Middleton Address?

If the ANZAC Friendship Match is about bringing people together, then, that's what the McMillan Dinner needed to do.

For that to happen, the McMillan Dinner needed a signature event. Given the footy happens on the weekend adjacent to ANZAC Day, it is reasonable to expect that there will potentially be some amazing speakers over the coming years. And so we needed to build a spot for a keynote speaker. And that spot was to become known as the Middleton Address in honour of Stan Middleton. We didn't name it after Stan because of what he did or didn't do in Vietnam – on or off the footy field. The ANZAC Friendship Match is about bringing people together – and that is exactly what Stan has done.

Within two weeks of our first footy match, Stan had found us and reached out; offering to help and to share his library of photos, contacts etc. He has continued to work tirelessly to help spread the word and has also been heavily involved with Water Safety Vietnam which also aims to teach children to swim.

The inaugural speaker of the Middleton Address

in 2012 was Peter Taylor, Kev McMillan's best mate.

Stan himself has also delivered the Middleton Address.

10. What is the Peter Badcoe Club?

The Peter Badcoe Club was a rest and recreation club for diggers during the war. The Imperial Hotel, where the McMillan Dinner will be held, stands on the site of the Peter Badcoe Club.

Major Peter Badcoe VC served in the Vietnam War and is the last South Australian to be awarded the Victoria Cross – the military's highest honour for bravery.

Since 2004, AFL Club, Port Adelaide has presented the Peter Badcoe VC Medal to the best player on the ground as part of ANZAC Round.

11. Where do proceeds from the ANZAC Friendship Match go?

The ANZAC Friendship Match's tagline is "Honouring lost lives; saving young lives". We remember and acknowledge the past and then, while we have everyone's attention, we offer them a way forward to make a positive difference.

Children are the future of Vietnam and with more children dying from drowning than road accidents, money raised will be donated to Swim Vietnam and Water Safety Vietnam. In addition, we also support the Vung Tau Orphanage. All proceeds from gate takings at the ground and raffles, less direct expenses, will be donated.
